Declawing & Outdoor Policies

DECLAWING: Companion Cats does not support declawing of felines at any age. Clawing is a natural, healthy, and important part of a cat's behavior. Declawing is the equivalent of cutting a person's fingers off at the first knuckle. This is a painful surgery with discomfort often persisting for a long period of time. With no claws, a cat is vulnerable to predators and human cruelty since the cat cannot defend itself whether inside the home or if outside for any reason. Just like with humans, toes assist with balance and a declawed cat has to relearn how to walk after surgery. Declawed cats often have litter box issues as well. Nearly 24 counties have banned or restricted declawing surgery. Many U.S. veterinarians refuse to do the procedure and consider it inhumane.

BEING LET OUTSIDE: Many of the felines that make up our Companion Cats rescue/adoption program have endured tremendous hardships, challenges, and heartache. Abiding by this rule ensures our cat(s) are being adopted into an inside environment where they are safe from vehicles, predators (humans and animals), environmental poisons, etc. At no time do we give consent for our adopted cats to be let outdoors.
